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The audience then heard some reflections from CEO, Maureen Watson.



Maureen spoke on all the challenges that SMN had faced over the course of the pandemic and thanked the membership for their continued support.

Maureen reflected on SMN's role to deliver high quality services and to influence policy and decision making. She passed on reassurance to the delegates, that despite the upcoming challenges - that SMN would continue to support the members.






MAPPING MENTORING FOR CARE EXPERIENCED CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

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Susie White and Colin MacFarlane then expanded on the findings, and discussed the challenges and opportunities which have been identified as part of this work.

Equality of access, consistency of delivery model and valuing the role of the co-ordinator are some of the challenges to delivering mentoring to this client group.

However there are many opportunities to improve the provision, particularly around collaboration. The presenters acknowledged that there are many specialist mentoring services, who each have their own areas of expertise - so the best way to take advantage of this collective expertise is through collaboration.

Facilitated Networking THREE BIG QUESTIONS

We asked the delegates to respond to three big questions that we want to know the answers to. We asked them to write their responses on to post it notes and stick them on big sheets of flip chart paper around the room.

Facilitated Networking THREE BIG QUESTIONS

Unsurprisingly, the biggest challenge which the delegates' identified was around funding, and particularly sustained funding - because this is the only way to ensure that mentees can have access to reliable mentoring support. Delegates were also concerned about the cost of living crisis and the impact that it's having on staff and volunteers.

Delegates agreed that the best thing about mentoring was seeing the progress of the mentees, and the difference that it makes to mentors and mentees lives. We asked the delegates what services should SMN be providing to support you. They shared lots of interesting ideas as well as reiterating the services we currently offer. Sharing, training, networking and opportunities were common themes across the responses. These are all very important to us and we will be discussing these ideas and will consider them in how we shape our future activities.

The delegates made many observations on these topics, and the discussions sparked lots of ideas for change.

These discussion topics were based on some external factors which may have an impact on mentoring services, and we felt it was important to offer members a chance to explore what the impact might be and how to respond to them.

The majority of tables agreed that the climate crisis and cost of living crises are interlinked, and both very challenging to tackle. Developing organisational and individual resilience, collaboration between mentoring organisations and involving funders and local authorities were some suggested ways to face these challenges.

The delegates were interested to learn more about the Volunteering Action Plan, and recognised that volunteering has also been impacted by the pandemic, and the climate and cost of living crises.
